

Summary of A-I-C On 12-13-18, Officer Meister was present in the Yellow Springs Police Department, off duty but in uniform, when a 9-1-1 call was received of an accidental shooting. When Dispatcher Ruth Peterson informed Officer Meister of the call, Officer Meister advised Dispatcher Peterson that he was going home and she was to call a supervisor. Officer Paul Raffoul, an officer with the Department for 8 months, was the only ofher officer on duty at the time. Officer Meister then left the building. As these issues and actions may represent violations of YSPD Policy, VYS Personnel Policy and along with the safety concerns for the welfare of the involved parties and the genaral public, an internal investigation is being conducted to look into these issues. Other issues may arise from futher investigation into this matter. The Clark County Sheriff's Office agreed to conduct this investigation on December 18, 2018. Det. Brian Melchi was assigned to perform the investigation by Sheriff Burchett.

On 12/13/18 at approximately 22:27, I responded to a call of shots fired at 111 1/2 Corry Street, in the Village of Yellow Springs Ohio.

As I was responding, I saw a woman on the phone, later identified as Noel Kambitsch, frantically running from the fire station at 225 Corry Street. I yelled out to her and asked her what's going on. Noel stated that he shot himself and that thore was a lot of blood. I then asked Noel where the victim was. Noel stated that he was on the second floor balcony at 111 1/2 Corry Street. I then arrived on scene at approximately 22:30 hours.

As I got out of my police cruiser, an unknown bystander stated that he saw a man in a bullet proof vest with an assault rifle, flee from the scene as he ran across the street into the parking lot of 100 Corry Street, and left in a black Volvo. I relayed the information to dispatch, retrieved my first responder AED from the front passenger seat of my cruiser, and started up the stairs of 111 1/2 Corry Street. As I started to walk up the stairs, I noticed that the right side of the stairs and hand rail were covered in blood as it was dripping from above, on the patio. I then walked up the left side of the stairs and got to the top. I looked to my right and observed a body lying on the ground, later identified as Kenneth Livingston.

Kenneth's body was approximately 4 feet from the front door of 111 1/2 Corry Street, where Nathan Hankle and Noel Kambitsch reside. Kenneth's head was pushed against a lawn chair. The lawn chair was pushed against the hand rall that separated the patio from the drop to the stairs leading up. Kenneth's body was twisted with the left side of his face touching the ground. Kenneth's knees were slightly up in his stomach with his left leg, slightly more extended. Kenneth's torso was also on the ground, with his left arm under his body. Kenneth's right arm was extended with his palm up. Next to Kenneth's right hand was a Springfield XD 40 with serial number US430557. The barrol of the gun was pointed down toward Kenneth's feet. The gun had long blonde hair stuck to the barrel that matched the hair on Kenneth's head. The gun also had blood splatter and presumably brain or skull fragments on it.

As I approached the body, I could visibly see a gunshot wound on the right side of Kenneth's head. There was a large amount of blood coming from Kenneth's head. Kenneth's head was surrounded by blood that was running past the hand rail, and down onto the stair way and mailbox below. I could not see any other wounds or holes on Kenneth's body due to the way his body was laying. I immediately knew Kenneth was dead as his body was motionless, the impact wound to his head, and the large amount of blood loss. I then relayed the information back to dispatch, that it appeared to be a self-inflicted gunshot wound to the head, and that he appeared to be dead. I then informed dispatch that the information of a fleeing shooter may not be accurate. Dispatch than informed the Groene County Deputy units that responded, G123, G344, G110, of this information.

At this time, Noel arrived back on scene and went inside of her home of 111 1/2 Corry Street, where her husband Nathan Hankle was as well.

I then inspected the firearm and made it safe. The handgun had 1 hollow point Hornady brand bullet in the chamber. There were then 6 more full metal jacket Winchester bullets in the magazine. The magazine had a 9 bullet capacity. I then observed 1 bullet casing on the floor next to the head and right shoulder of Kenneth's body. I then unloaded the firearm and made the scene safe for Miami Township Fire Rescue to come on scene.

At approximately 22:38 hours, Fire Chief Altman arrived on scene and pronounced Kenneth Livingston dead. I then I asked dispatch to call the coroner to the scene.

I then photographed the firearm and scone. I then took the firearm in my custody, and locked it in the trunk of my patrol cruiser, where it remained.

I then reached into the back right pocket of Kenneth's body without disturbing or moving it. I retrieved his wallet with his ID in it to confirm his identity. There wasn't any money in the wallet, but his credit cards were still there. It did not appear that anyone had gone through it.

As other Greene County deputies arrived on scene, I started talking to witnesses and gathering information.

At approximately 22:52, Chief Carison Y1 of the YSPD arrived on scene.

At approximately 23:13 hours, the Greene County Coroner, John Turner was on scene.

At approximately 23:34, the Fire department left the scene.

At approximately 23:35, Sergeant Knapp Y56 of the YSPD arrived on scene.

The Coroner and I then started photographing the scene and searched the body and surrounding area for evidence.

On Kenneth's body was found a pocket knife that was located under him. The pocket knife had blood on it and was closed. In Kenneth's right back pocket was his wallet, which I removed earlier. In Kenneth's coat pocket was two small plastic bags

full of a green leafy plant based material that appeared to be, and smelled liko marljuana. The marijuana weighed a total of 32.9 grams approximately. Also on Kenneth's body were car keys that the tow company later took, loose change in his pockets, and other miscellaneous items that the coroner took.

l entered the gun, ammo, magazîne, bullet casing, and marlJuana into evidenco later that night.

Coroner John Turner and I then sealed Kenneth in the body bag. We then moved the body to the Coroner's vehicle and he left the scene.

At approximately 00:19 house on 12/14/18, Moorman's Towing arrived on scene to remove Kenneth's vehicle, a Gold Dodge Caravan with OH Registration HLY1670, which was parked in the parking lot of 100 Corry Street. Sergeant Knapp and I first went through the vehicle and inventoried it. The vehicle was full of junk, power tools, hand tools, and other miscellaneous items. Nothing was removed. The vehicle was then towed to 395 South Miami Ave, in Xenia Ohlo, with a hold placed on it.

At approximately 01:20 hours, Chief Carlson and I poured kitty litter on the blood at the scene to help clean it up. The scene was fully processed before that time.

At approximately 01:40 hours, I was clear from the scene.

Henry Hill, a witness that was standing on the second floor patio with Kenneth as the shot took place, stated that there was no fleeing shooter, and that the person seen running away was their friend, Jasoh Ryder, as he was scared and didn't know what to do. Henry stated that Jason was inside of the house during the event. Henry then stated that during the event, he was on the patio with the grill and hot dogs they were about to cook. Henry stated he was outside alone, taking a moment away from everyone. Henry then stated that Madeleine Ramage walked up the stairs to the second floor patio and stood next to Henry. As soon as Madeleine was at the top of the stairs, Henry stated that Kenneth came out to the patio from Inside, to smoke a cigarette. Henry stated that the three of them were all very happy to see each other. Henry then stated that they all hugged each other and jumped up and down because they were so happy, as they hadn't seen each other in a while. Henry stated that they were all standing with their back against the wall of the house. Henry stated that Kennoth was in between Madeleine and himself, with Madeleine on Kenneth's left, and Henry on Kenneth's right. Henry then stated that Kenneth pulled out his handgun that he is known to have, and cocked the slide. Henry then stated that Kenneth is known to be goofy in these moments where he is happy and intoxicated; and that he wasn't surprised when Kenneth pulled out his gun. Henry then stated that he was about to tell Kenneth to put his gun away, but that the shot happened so fast. Henry stated that he saw Kenneth put it up to his head with what he believed was his right hand, Henry said he heard a pop and saw a flash of light, but was in disbelief at first. Henry then stated that the way he saw Konneth drop to the floor was different, and that he knew he was dead during that moment. Honry stated that he knew what had happened, but was concerned about Madeleine and wanted to get her out of there. Henry then stated that he told Madeleine to grab his hand and they quickly left down the stairs. Henry stated that he and Madeleine left and went to sit down in Kings Yard while they processed what had happened. During this time, Henry stated he was trying to call Jason, as he knew he would be the next one outside, but Jason did not answer the phone. Henry stated that while he and Madeleine were sitting in Kings Yard, that they heard fireworks, but knew they were not gunshots. Henry stated that he only heard fireworks after the gunshot took place, and not before. Henry then stated that he and Madeleine returned to the scene approximately 10 to 15 minutes later and saw EMS. Henry stated that he knew he had to explain what had happened as he and Madeleine were the only ones that saw it.

Henry also noted on Kenneth's prior history with firearms as he is known to be reckless and playful with it when drunk. Henry stated that he specifically saw Kenneth many times before, pull out the same gun and put it to his head and pull the trigger. Henry stated he believed Kenneth did not realize the gun had bullets in it, as he always removed them when he was drinking, like he was that night. Henry also stated that he believed Kenneth's gun was an XD 40, tan in color. A written statement was obtained from Henry on 12/15/18 stating the previous.

A written statement was later obtained from Madeleine Ramage on 12/14/18. Madeleine stated that she had went up to Nate's porch from the spirited goat coffee shop. Madeleine stated that she got up to the patio where Hank was standing outside, and as soon as she go there. Kenneth walked out to the patio from inside. Madelaine then stated that about a minute later, Kenneth pulled out a gun, put it to his head, pulled the trigger, and then he collapsed. Madeleine then stated that she wasn't even there for 5 minutes before all of that happened. Madeleine then stated that she did not believe Kenneth meant to kill himself. Madeleine then stated that she and Hank left as she was scared. Madeleine then stated that she and Hank returned to the scene after the police were there.

A written statement was obtained later on 12/13/18 from the 911 caller Tomi-Maya Harris. Maya wrote that she was in the back of Peaches parking lot. Maya looked over to the balcony of apartment 111 1/2 Corry Street and saw people up there. Maya then wrote that she heard two bangs and stated that she knew they were not fireworks. Maya then saw someone fall and she knew something wasn't right. Maya then wrote that she ran over, called 911 and heard people screaming as she was doing so. Maya then wrote that she saw someone laying on the floor of the balcony, but did not know who it was. Maya then stated that she was around the balcony for approximately 3 minutes before site freaked out and ran back. Maya then and that the saw three people across the street light fireworks in the flower bads of 100 Corry Street after the gunshots.

Maya stated that it was two boys and one girl shooting fireworks. Maya then wrote that she believed that Madeloine Ramage was on the balcony during the event.

On 12/14/18, I obtained a written statement from Noel Kambitsch who was inside her room during the incident. Noel wrote that at about 22:25 hours, Nate and Jason came busting into her room yelling that Kenneth shot himself. Noel then wrote that she was in her room with the door closed while she was watching TV. Noel then wrote that she ran out to the porch and saw Kenneth on the ground in a pool of blood. Noel then wrote that she called 911. At the scene on 12/13/18, Noel stated to me that while she was on the phone, she ran down the patio, over Kenneth's body and across the street to the Fire Department to get help. As I was responding to the call, I saw Noel running back from the Fire Department while on the phone.

While at 111 1/2 Corry Street on 12/14/18, Noel came outside and gave me a camo waist pack that she and Nathan believed was Kenneth's. Noel stated they opened the front pouch, and saw an empty handgun magazine and knew it was Kenneth's. They stated they did not look into any other pouches on the waist pack. The camo waist pack and its contents were then entered into property where I found an empty XD 40 handgun magazine with a 12 builet capacity, a yellow Springfield Armory handgun lock, a rifle cleaning barrel rope, 2 different boxes of injury patches, 3 separate rolls of medical tape, and 2 pairs of white gloves.

On 12/15/18, I dictated a statement for Nathan Hankie while in his home at 111 1/2 Corry Street. Nathan stated that he was in his chair at his computer during the time of the incident. Nathan stated that Kenneth walked in with an empty firearm and his camo walst pack on. Nathan stated he knew the firearm was empty because he cleared the gun himself. Nathan stated that he cleared the gun because Kenneth gave it to him to look at, and Nathan cleared it first because he knows proper firearm safety. Nathan then stated that he gave the firearm back to Kenneth in an empty state, but did not know what Kenneth did with the gun after that. Nathan then stated that Kenneth had 2 magazines, one full of ammo, and the other empty because he found the camo walst pack with no bullets in it. Nathan then stated that he and Kenneth sat at his computer, watched videos; and were about to make dinner and smoke a "doobie" with Jason and Henry. Nathan then stated that Kenneth got up and went outside to check the grill, as they were going to make hotdogs. Nathan then stated that Jason heard a pop and went outside, as Jason was in the kitchen preparing food at that time. Nathan stated that he however did not hear anything. Nathan stated that Jason ran outside and saw Kenneth on the ground and started yelling. Jason then ran back inside yelling for Noel to call 911. Nathan then ran outside, saw Kenneth on the ground, and held his body. Nathan stated that while outside, he didn't even bother looking for a gun as he was only worried about Kenneth. Nathan then stated after that

Due to the evidence collected, witness statements and the consistency of their accounts of the events; I believe that Kenneth's death was a result of firearms negligence on his part, and an accidental shooting.

Nothing further at this time until the Coroner report.

NCIDENT DATE AND THRE 12/14/2018 13:00

On 12-13-18 at approximately 2234 hours, I recieved a call at home from Dispatcher Peterson. She advised me that there was shooting that occurred at 111 1/2 Corry St. At that time, there was one male victim and it was unknown if the shooting was self-inflicted or if there was a criminal offense that happened. There was also information that a black Volvo was seen fleeling the scene and a person wearing a ballistic vest, carrying a gun or gun case, was seen leaving in that car. I was told that Officer Raffoul was the only officer on-duty at the time and that units from the Greene County Sheriff's Office were dispatched to assist Ofc. Raffoul, I advised Disp. Peterson to call Chief Carlson since he lives closer to town than I and that I would also respond.

I also contacted Chief Carlson since Disp. Peterson was handling multiple tasks. I informed Chief Carlson of the information I had received and he responded to Yellow Springs.

I arrived at YSPD at approximately 2320 hours and gathered some equipment to respond to the scene with. There were two females in the lobby of YSPD when I arrived and one was writting a witness statement. The witness, Tomi Maya-Harris, and I briefly spoke and I asked her what took place. She told me that she was standing in the rear parking lot of Peach's Grill (104 Xenia Ave) talking to friends. She stated that there were fireworks being set off in the area of Dayton St and Corry St. While standing in the lot, Tomi saw a couple of people on the balcony of 111 1/2 Corry St and thon she heard 2 loud bangs that sounded like gunshots and then she saw someone fall to the floor of the balcony. She then ran around the corner towards 111 1/2 Corry and saw several people running from that area. She did not know who they were but was able to identify Madeline Ramage as being a person running from the location. I asked if there was any scuffle or arguing between the people on the balcony before this took place and was told that she did not observe anything unusual and the people on the balcony just looked to be hanging out. I then departed and responded to the scene.

Once I arrived, I was met by Chief Carlson. He briefly explained that from the statement of a person who present during the incident, the male victim shot himself in the head. It was told to me that the victim, Kenneth Livingston, was playing with a handgun that he owned and after being told to put the gun away, Kenneth said it wasn't loaded and put the gun to his head and pulled the trigger. We then went up to the porch where this incient happened. I observed a large amount of fresh blood on the steps leading up to the balcony. Once there, I observed Ofc. Raffoul assisting Coroner's Investigator John Turner. They were placing Kenneth's body inside a body bag. I saw a large pool of blood on the edge of the balcony that was running off the porch and onto the steps below. Ofc. Raffoul explained the situation to me. He stated that from he had gathered, There were 5 people at this location, preparing to grill out. The parties were drinking and hanging out with each other. Just before the incident, witness Henry Hill and Kenneth came out onto the balcony to have a cigarette. Madeline had just arrived and then Kenneth pulled his gun out and was "playing around" with it. Henry told Kenneth to stop and to put the gun away. Kenneth responded by saying that it wasn't loaded and the put the gun to his head and pulled the trigger. Both Henry and Madeline got scarod and ran down the steps and away from the apartment. Henry returned a short time later and told Ofc, Raffoul this information. Ofc. Raffoul told me that there was another person who left immediately after the incident as well, who was identified as Jason Ryder. Jason had not been contacted by this point nor had he retunned. Ofc. Raifoul stated that there was information that a person was seen leaving in a black vehicle and that the person was wearing a ballistic vest and was carrying an assault rifle but that information could not corroberated. It was believed that Jason Ryder was the person in the black vehicle however. The two residents, Nate and Noel, were still inside the apartment.

I stood by until the body was removed by the investigator and the body retrieval team and then made contact with the residents of 111 1/2 Corry St, Nathan (Nate) Hanke and Noel Kambitsch. Both parties were upset and crying. I asked them what happened. Both stated that they weren't really sure. They stated that everyone was just kind of hanging around and talking when Henry and Kenneth went outside. They were getting ready to grill hotdogs and have dinner as a group. Noel stated that she was watching TV and Nate said he was listoning to music. There had been fireworks being set off near the increaction of Dayton and Corry around the time this happened and they weren't aware of anything being wrong until Jason came back to them and told them what happened. They both then went outside and saw Kenneth laying on the ground. Noel said that she called 911 but it seemed to be taking a while for anyone to arrive to she ran down towards the fire department and then came back a few minutes later. They had no other information to help explain how this incident occurred. While in the home, I observed fresh produce and food preperation items sitting on the counter. I then went back outside and saw hotdogs and burns sitting on a tray near a grill.

I saw Chief Carison collecting a statement from Henry and Ofc. Raffoul was speaking to investigator Turner. Turner recovered a set of keys from Kenneth's clothing. Those keys were turned over to Ofc. Raffoul. I was informed that Kenneth's van was parked in the private lot of 100 Corry St. Ofc. Raffoul walked over to the van and looked inside. There was large quantity of construction equipment inside the van. I ran the license plate and confirmed the van belonged to Kenneth. The van is a gold 2001 Dodge Caravan. The van was towed by Mooreman's Towing to their impound lot in Xenia for safekeeping. We conducted an inventory search of the vehicle prior to it being towed. We did not remove any property from the van. We had unconfirmed information that Kenneth may have had other guns in the van but due to the conditions inside, we could not locate any other firearms. There was a large amount of construction equipment, trash and other items inside the van, making it difficult to search.

We then attempted to assist Nate and Noel with cleaning up the blood at the scene but the Fire Department could not assist with washing the blood away due to it being washod into the street and sidowalks, creating a further issue. We located some biological cleaning service companies and gave those numbers to Nate. Chief Carlson purchased cat litter and

spread if over the blood to absorb it and prevent further contamination of surrounding surfaces. We cleared the scene an responded back to YSPD. Ofc. Raffoul, Chief Carlson and I spoke briefly about necessary follow up and then we departed.

On 12-14-18, Chief Carlson and I checked around town for Madeline and Jason to follow up on this case. We were unsuccessful in locating them at that time but I left a message on Jason's cell phone for him and Chief Carlson made contact with some known associates of Madeline to have her contact him. A short while later, Jason returned my call. I asked him to come in for an interview and he agreed to. At approximately 1300 hours, Jason arrived at YSPD, We spoke about the incident and the circumstances. Jason said that he arrived at Nate's apartment between 2100-2130 hours. He stated that Kenneth was already there and that he was drinking beer. Jason had no knowledge of Kenneth's alcohol or drug consumption prior to his arrival but stated that Kenneth was intoxicted when he arrived. Jason described Kenneth as being drunk but he wasn't so drunk that he could not walk or talk. He stated that Kenneth was not "dependant" in his level of intoxication. Jason said that the group decided to grill some food and that they were all just having a good time. He said that prior to making food, Kenneth showed him his handgun. Jason said that Kenneth unloaded the gun and made sure it was safe and then handed it around for the others to "check out". Jason stated that he held the gun and checked it out and then gave it back to Kenneth. Jason then went in to start preparing food for dinner. At this point, Kenneth and Henry go outside to smoke and he hears them laughing on the porch. Jason sald that heard a female arrive and greet Henry and Kenneth. He recognized the voice but was not sure who the female was. Jason then described the volume of the people on the porch get quite, which was unusual. He then heard a loud bang and a "thud" but couldn't see out the kitchen window to see what happened. He went outside and tripped over something and turned on a light. He then saw Kenneth laying on the ground and blood everywhere. He said that Kenneth was laying on the porch with his head pointed towards Williams Eatry. This location is directly north of 111 1/2 Corry St. He said that he saw a gun laying near Kenneth and that it looked unloaded to him. I asked Jason what he meant by unloaded. He described it as the action or slide of the gun being pushed back. He was unsure if there was a magazine in it or not. Jason said that he then got confused and scared and noticed that no one else was around now. He said that He went into the house and told Nate and Noel about what he saw. They then went out and Noel called 911. Nate returned Inside. Jason then started checking for Henry and the other person there. He stated that he got in his car and started driving around, looking for the other people. He said that he didn't know what happened to them and thought that they may be in trouble or hurt. Jason couldn't find them so he went to a friend's house. Jason said he returned to Nate's house a while later and no one was there. He said he went up to the apartment again and found the cat litter everywhere and then made contact with Nate to figure out what happened.

I asked Jason why he didn't contact the police after the fact and he stated that he was shocked and confused. He said that he didn't know what happened and didn't think he could add any relevant information. I asked Jason if there were any other weapons at the house that night. He stated that Nate has some pellet rifles that he is aware of but those were not brought out at anytime. I asked Jason about the reported assault rifle and person in a ballistic vest that was seen in the area. Jason said that he had no idea about that information and did not see anyone matching that description. I asked Jason if Kenneth noramlly possessed weapons. He said that he did have one with him frequently. I asked him about Kenneth's behavior with guns and he stated that Kenneth did like to show his gun off but that he was always safe with it. Jason said that it was unlike Kenneth to act recklessly with his gun. Jason was visiably upset while we spoke and while he completed his written statement. Jason could not provide any information that would discredit the event as being a seff-inflicted gun shot resulting in Kenneth's death. Jason's written statement was attached to this report.

There is no further information at this time on this case.

On 12-12-2018 at approximately 22:37 I was contacted by Sgt. Josh Knapp and the YSPD dispatcher Ruth Peterson about a gunshot incident at 111 1/2 Corry Street, I responded from home and arrived on scene at approximately 22:52.

On scene I spoke briefly with Officer Raffoul Unit 79 and received a brief synopsis of what had transpired. I assisted by taping off the area and speaking with concerned residents. I provided a statement form to Mr. Henry (Hank) Hill who told me he was standing next to the victim of the gunshot wound.

Mr. Hill told me he was upstairs at 111 1/2 Corry Street at a cookout with his friend Madeline Ramage and Mr. Kenneth Livingston. Mr Hill told me Kennith "sometimes would point his gun at his head."

Mr. Hill told me Mr. Livingston removed his gun from the holster and shot himself in the head before he "could say anything". Mr. Hill and his friend Madeline ran from scene because they were terrified and "knew Kenny was dead."

The Greene County Coroner John Turner asked if I would join him in notifying Mr. Livingston's wife of his passing. We went to 243 Whitehall to meet with Ms. Heather Livingston. At the door we introduced ourselves and asked to speak with Ms. Livingston. There were several people in the front room and I noticed one of our officers wives Ms. Zo Van Eaton Melster in the room. Ms. Livingston turned, saw me and stated so it is him "you are sure?" The Coroner explained Mr. Livingston's passing and we offered condolences and contact information.

I returned to the scene where MTFR Chief Altman and I determined it would be best to do a dry clean up of the scene rather than hose the area down at that time. I retrieved several bags of cat litter and covered all areas containing fluids and matter. I returned to remove the waste the following day.

After I completed clean up the fire department came to hose the area down and apply salt.

On Monday Decmber 17th I met with Immediate family to assist in obtaining Mr. Livingstons personal effects.

I met with Ms. Heather Livingston to offer assistance and provide contect information to our Community Outreach Specialist.

Nothing further at this time.

Internal Investigation for Yellow Springs Police Department

On December 18, 2018 I was notified by Clark County Chief Deputy Jeff Meyer that Patti Bates, Yellow Springs Village Manager had contacted him to see if our office could assist the Village of Yellow Springs to conduct an internal investigation on a member of their Police Department. Chief Deputy Meyer assigned this internal to myself and Deputy Amanda Mitchell.

Background on reason for Request for Internal:

On December 20, 2018 I met Patti Bates, Yellow Springs Village Manager at her office at 1000 hours. She advised there had been an accidental shooting call in the village on December 13, 2018. She stated when the dispatcher received the call, there were two officers in dispatch. One was a rookie officer who was the officer on duty at the time. She further stated the other officer, David Meister was there, as he had just finished paperwork from a late call. She stated the rookie officer, Officer Paul Raffoul responded to the scene of the shooting, but Officer Meister advised the dispatcher that he was going home and she should call a supervisor. Ms. Bates has concerns this violated the Yellow Springs Police Department Policy, Village of Yellow Springs Personnel Policy, and also safety concerns for the involved parties and the general public. She provided me copies of the policy and the Oath of Office form. I was also provided a copy of the incident report from the call in question. Finally I was provided with the DVD with the cameras from the office building and also several 911 calls received by the dispatcher from Officer Meister and his wife. I advised her I would review these items and I would send notices on when the involved parties in this matter needed to appear before us for the interviews on the internal investigation.

On December 26, 2018 I reviewed the video first. The video where the officers were standing and dispatch was located was the main camera. At 2228 hours, Officer Raffoul leaves the building and Officer Meister stays behind in dispatch. This is when Officer Raffoul went to the

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scene of the call. There did not appear to be any communication between Officer Raffoul and Officer Meister when he left. The camera then shows Officer Meister as it appears he is listening to radio traffic on his portable and looking at his phone. At 2232 hours, Officer Meister leaves the area.

On the same date, I then listened to the calls into dispatch. The first call the caller states this is Zoe. I did confirm that Zoe is the wife of Officer David Meister. She states she is at Heather Livingston's house. She indicated that Heather is the wife of the deceased. She stated she is flipping out and needs verification. Dispatcher Peterson advises her she cannot give that. She then states that Dave just came over. The next call, Officer Meister calls in. He ask if someone is going to make notification to his wife. He stated they are separated but still married. He also states that she is having a rough time and if she could just relay that please. The next call is from Zoe again. She calls back in with the phone number for Heather. The final call is from Zoe again. She called in to see if Nipper is awake and aware of this. It should be noted that during the upcoming interviews, we will be asking why and how Officer Meister's wife knew so much about what had happened on this call.

Finally on December 26, 2018, I emailed the notices to appear for the internal investigation to Village Manager Patti Bates. She emailed me back the copies later showing that the Police Chief personally served all of these notices on the same day. The date for the interviews will be Wednesday January 2, 2019 starting at 1600 hours in the Art Room at the Village Offices in Yellow Springs.

Interviews for Internal Investigation:

On January 2, 2019 we began the interviews with the following three people, Dispatcher Ruth Peterson, Officer Paul Raffoul and Officer David Meister.

First we interviewed Dispatcher Ruth Peterson. She advised she has been a dispatcher for 14 years and also a Clerk for the village. Her basic duties consist of answering phones, give directions, tell officers where they are going, does reporting on stats and does the dispatcher schedule. She confirmed she was working on December 13, 2018 from 1500 hours to 2300 hours. She stated the call in question came in at 2227 hours. This was a call in reference to a shooting at 111 ½ Corry Street in the Village limits. She advised the call came in on 911, which was transferred to her by Greene County. She stated another caller stated they thought the sound was fireworks and not a gun shot. There was then a call that stated there was a possible subject in a black Volvo leaving the scene with an AR15 rifle. She stated when the call came in, both officers were standing in dispatch. She stated Paul advised he would go. She advised she was giving instructions to rookie officer to secure the scene. I advised Ms. Peterson after I watched the video in dispatch, one officer left and one stayed behind. I asked her if she could tell me what that other officer who stayed behind said to her. She stated Officer Meister leaned down to her and said this is where you call your sergeant. She stated he then left. I then asked since I had listened to the calls into dispatch, if Officer Meister called back into dispatch for anything. She stated his wife called in and stated she was with the victim's wife. She advised Officer Meister then called in and asked about the coroner making notification.

The next interview was with Officer Paul Raffoul. He stated he has been a Police Officer for seven months with the Village. The only other law enforcement job he has had was with the Summit Behavioral Hospital in Cincinnati for three years. He stated his job with Yellow Springs consist of patrol, police duties and some investigations. He also confirmed he was working on December 13, 2018. When asked if he received a call about a shooting at 111½ Corry street he advised dispatch took the call. He advised he and Officer Meister were in the room in dispatch. He advised Dispatcher Peterson received a call of either fireworks or a shooting at this location. He also stated the caller stated someone was bleeding from the head. I then asked him what took

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place during this call. He stated he was not expecting a shooting. He stated he has never been on one before. He advised a woman was running from the fire department on the phone. She advised him that the person had shot themselves in the head. He also had one witness say there was a guy that had an AR15 with a vest on and got into a Black Volvo and left the area. I then asked him about the video in dispatch. He stated he was the only officer on duty. He stated that Officer Meister was there as he had finished a late call but did not say anything to him when he left for the call and never offered to go with him or help him. He also stated Officer Meister never called him on the radio asking for help. I then asked him if Officer Meister ever responded to the scene to assist him. He stated he never saw him. He also stated he kinda half expected to see him show up. I asked Officer Raffoul if Officer Meister would have known this was his first major event call and he stated he would have known this. He also stated for Officer Meister to go home, he would have had to pass the scene in question. I then asked Officer Raffoul what he would have done if he was the other officer and the one officer was on the scene by himself. He stated he would have grabbed a cruiser and went to the scene or asked if they needed any help.

The last interview was with Officer David Meister. Officer Meister also came with his attorney, David Duwel. He confirmed he was a Peace Officer for the Village for about nine years. He stated he does basic patrol duties, Firearms Instructor, Taser Instructor and an FTO. He advised he was working on December 13, 2018. His assigned hours were 1100 hours to 2100 hours. He stated he received a late call at 2045 hours. After that call, he still had to return to the office for paperwork and did not sign out of service on his time sheet until 2215 hours. I advised him according to the video, it showed himself and Officer Raffoul in dispatch when the shooting call came in. He advised he was in dispatch talking. He was getting ready to leave when the call came in. He advised he had a little discussion when the call came in. I then advised him after Officer Raffoul left to respond to the shooting call, it was just he and Dispatcher Peterson in the room. I asked him what the conversation was with her during the time Officer Raffoul left and he left. He stated he was listening to what was going on. He advised Greene County Sheriff's Office and the fire department had already been dispatched to the scene to assist. He stated according to Officer Raffoul's radio traffic, he discovered the body and gun on arrival. He stated this is when he told Dispatcher Peterson to call the Sergeant. He also stated he told Dispatcher Peterson he was available to come out if necessary. He stated that Dispatcher Peterson acknowledged that. He was then asked where he went when he left dispatch and he advised he went home and confirmed he did not go by the scene. I then asked Officer Meister if he or his

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wife called into dispatch after he arrived home and if so how would his wife have known the details on what took place. Officer Meister advised he went home and told his wife what happened and that Mr. Livingston was dead. He stated that Mr. Livingston is his neighbor. He stated since they separated he has not been staying there but Mr. Livingston's Wife is still living there. I then asked what details were given by Mr. Meister to his wife or the victim's wife. He stated he did not give her any details. He stated that Mr. Livingston's wife had already been called by a relative and told he had been shot in the head. He stated his wife went over to be with her and then he also went over until two of her friends arrived to be with her. I then asked Officer Meister if there was anything else important to this investigation. He advised there was never a request made for him to respond to the scene. He also stated when he left dispatch, the officer on scene had the scene contained and the fire department had already confirmed the victim was deceased. He also stated that Mr. Livingston's wife asked him if he could tell her what happened and he advised he could not. Officer Meister then pointed out a section of the contract that if an officer works over, this has to be approved by a Sergeant. However he stated this does not apply if the officer is going on a late call. He advised this was on Page 50 of the Policy section 402 Timekeeping and Page 53 section 410 of Overtime.

There was one part of Officer Meister's interview that did not match. He stated that he told Dispatcher Peterson that he was available to come out if necessary and she acknowledged that. We brought Dispatcher Peterson back in to clarify that question. She was advised of what Officer Meister said about being available. She stated he did not say that because if he had said that, she would have told him to get to the scene to assist.

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Policy Review and Possible Violations:

We reviewed the two sections of the policy that Officer Meister pointed out. Although it states Overtime must be approved by the Supervisor, it also states it may be performed in cases where it is necessary to complete arrest or paperwork needed immediately for the prosecutor or court. This section is very open ended and in our view does not apply to something like a shooting where an immediate need for assistance and manpower is needed. The thought of Overtime when there has been a shooting and a single officer on scene handling it should be the last thing on an officer's mind at that time. The section about overtime on Page 53 only states about Overtime that if offered and how the rate of pay is except for where is states overtime work must receive prior authorization by the supervisor. Again, we refer to the statement above that overtime pay and contacting a supervisor for approval on a shooting should be the last thing on someone's mind at the time of a serious call such as this.

We then reviewed the Yellow Springs Police Department Law Enforcement Code of Ethics that was provided to us. The first line in part states that as a law enforcement officer, my fundamental duty is to serve the community to safeguard lives and property. This was not done by Officer Meister. By not responding to the scene to assist, not knowing if there was still someone around with an AR15, this clearly was not serving the community and safeguarding lives. The second paragraph in part states, Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided in me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty. Again, by Officer Meister going home and telling his wife that this victim was dead was not keeping this information confidential. There would be no need since he did not respond to the scene to tell anyone what took place since he did not have the details from the scene to be able to even provide accurate information. By going home and telling his wife

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this was not keeping this information or what he heard in dispatch confidential. Finally we also noted Section 320.5.8, Performance of the YSPD Policy Manual. Section D on this states in part that interfering with any investigation or case being handled by any other employees of the police department unless a supervisor orders it. Again not only by telling his wife what took place, but having both of them calling into dispatch for information after he was off work, this tied up the phone line with the dispatcher and caused what would be interference in her performing her work duties trying to call others and give information to the officer on scene.

Finally we looked at the Village of Yellow Springs Personnel Policy. We read section 703, Unacceptable Behaviors. In part is states Dishonesty and neglect of duty shall be cause for disciplinary action. We believe there was a neglect of duty on Officer Meister's part by not responding to the scene and assisting a fellow officer on a serious call such as a shooting and possibly a person leaving the scene with an AR15. The fact the policy of having overtime approved by a sergeant causes great concern if there is an officer in need of assistance and the only thing a person is worried about is overtime approval.

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Conclusion:

The basis of the call was a subject was shot and there was blood everywhere. There was also a report of a person leaving the scene with an AR15. Officer Raffoul responded to the scene right away and began any possibly life saving efforts and securing the scene. The fact that Officer Meister did not even respond to assist in life saving efforts or helping a fellow officer with not only scene control but scene safety and was quick to point out in his interview about overtime needing approval causes great concern. There was a victim that needed immediate help and an officer trying to control a scene by himself and Officer Meister was less than a minute away and chose to go home instead of helping. Also, we believe that Officer Meister was not truthful in saying that he offered to come out if necessary to the dispatcher because after speaking to her, she was confidant that her 14 years of experience would have told her that she would have told him to go to the scene if he offered. Finally, going home and advising his wife even of the basic details was a violation of not keeping this information confidential since this was an ongoing investigation at that time this was told to her.







LAW ENFORCEMENT CODE OF ETHICS

As a law enforcement officer, my fundamental duty is to serve the community; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation and the peaceful against abuse or disorder; and to respect the constitutional rights of all to liberty, equality and justice.


I will keep my private life unsullied as an example to all and will behave in a manner that does not bring discredit to me or to my agency. I will maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed both in my personal and official life, I will be exemplary in obeying the law and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, political beliefs, aspirations, animosities or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or abuse and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of police service. I will never engage in acts of corruption or bribery, nor will I condone such acts by other police officers. I will cooperate with all legally authorized agencies and their representatives in the pursuit of justice.

I know that I alone am responsible for my own standard of professional performance and will take every reasonable opportunity to enhance and improve my level of knowledge and competence.

I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession . . . law enforcement.



410 Overtime Compensation

Effective Date: 08/20/2014

When operating requirements or other needs cannot be met during regularly scheduled work hours, employees will be given the opportunity to volunteer for overtime work assignments. In the event the Village is not able to meet its operational requirements by those who volunteer to work overtime, mandatory overtime will be assigned. Overtime work must receive prior authorization by the supervisor. Overtime will be distributed as equitably as is practical among employees qualified to perform the required work. Part-time and as-needed employees are normally not permitted to work overtime. In the event that overtime is worked by these employees, the conditions above and the rates below will apply.

Overtime compensation is paid to all non-exempt employees, in accordance with federal and state laws, based on hours worked. For purposes of calculating overtime, "hours worked" shall include paid time off for sick, vacation and personal leave.

In accordance with the Fair Labor Standards Act, Regular Full-Time, Part-Time, and As-Needed non-exempt employees who work (through a combination of work and paid time off for sick, vacation and personal leave) in excess of 40 hours in a week will be paid overtime at a rate of 1 ½ times the employee's regular hourly rate.

Regular full-time employees may elect compensatory time off at the applicable overtime rate for each overtime hour worked in lieu of payment for overtime hours worked, up to a maximum accumulation of eighty (80) hours. Accrued compensatory time may be used by the employee for paid time off, subject only to reasonable advance notice to the supervisor. Use of compensatory time shall not be denied, except where the requested absence would result in operational hardship. Upon termination, accrued but unused compensatory time shall be paid at the employee's then hourly rate.

411 Call-ln Pay

Effective Date: 08/20/2014

Call-in pay applies only to regular full-time non-exempt Village employees. Call-in is defined as an occurrence when an employee is notified during his or her off-duty hours of the need to come to work. These provisions do not apply to scheduled overtime, which is defined as an occurrence when the notification of the need to work additional hours occurs during the employee's work hours.

Overtime Procedures

To keep overtime equal and consistent, one document will account for patrol overtime. This document will track volunteer and mandated overtime for full-time officers. Patrol personnel will be responsible to cover manpower shortages related to day-to-day patrol operations. **All personnel** will be responsible to cover special duties or other events.

Overtime will be posted as soon as possible through email and/or posted on the bulletin board near the gun room. Overtime will be assigned in the following manner:

- Off duty personnel awarded to the most senior officer or sergeant, with the least amount of overtime activity. If a sergeant is not working, a sergeant will be given the first opportunity.
- 2. Any on duty personnel, in which the overtime would not require the officer/sergeant to work more than 14 scheduled hours (under normal circumstances), unless given permission by the supervisor or Chief of Police.
- 3. The officer with the least amount of seniority and the least amount of ordered activity will be selected.

a. Exceptions:

- When overtime is needed to cover patrol duties, the officer next in line according to seniority and number of orders, will be called in if no one volunteers. This will count as an order.
- ii. If the officer is on extended vacation time, the days off adjacent to his/her-vacation are included when considering availability.
- b. If a sergeant creates the overtime. The 2nd sergeant should be considered for the overtime before ordering an officer. The schedule at that time will dictate the availability of the 2nd sergeant. An officer or sergeant will not be ordered to work multiple days in a row.
- c. If any officer, full or part-time, volunteers to cover an open shift, they are responsible for that shift. In the event they cannot work the open shift, the officer will be responsible for finding coverage by another officer.

^{*} This procedure is only a guideline and all attempts to fill overtime will be made as stated. There may be some unique situations in which the on-duty supervisor may need to assign personnel depending on the situation.

Yellow Springs PD Policy Manual

Standards of Conduct

320.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

This policy establishes standards of conduct that are consistent with the values and mission of the Yellow Springs Police Department and are expected of all department members. The standards contained in this policy are not intended to be an exhaustive list of requirements and prohibitions but they do identify many of the important matters concerning conduct. In addition to the provisions of this policy, members are subject to all other provisions contained in this manual, as well as any additional guidance on conduct that may be disseminated by this department or the member's supervisors.

These standards are in addition to the standards set forth in the Village of Yellow Springs Personnel Policy Manual.

320.1.1 CERTIFICATION STANDARDS

This policy contains content that pertains to the following Ohio Collaborative Law Enforcement Agency Certification (OCLEAC) Standard: 12.2016.4

320.2 POLICY

The continued employment or appointment of every member of the Yellow Springs Police Department shall be based on conduct that reasonably conforms to the guidelines set forth herein. Failure to meet the guidelines set forth in this policy, whether on- or off-duty, may be cause for disciplinary action.

320,3 DIRECTIVES AND ORDERS

Members shall comply with lawful directives and orders from any department supervisor or person in a position of authority, absent a reasonable and bona fide justification.

320.3.1 UNLAWFUL OR CONFLICTING ORDERS

Supervisors shall not knowingly issue orders or directives that, if carried out, would result in a violation of any law or department policy. Supervisors should not issue orders that conflict with any previous order without making reasonable clarification that the new order is intended to countermand the earlier order.

No member is required to obey any order that appears to be in direct conflict with any federal law, state law or local ordinance. Following a known unlawful order is not a defense and does not relieve the member from criminal or civil prosecution or administrative discipline. If the legality of an order is in doubt, the affected member shall ask the issuing supervisor to clarify the order or shall confer with a higher authority. The responsibility for refusal to obey rests with the member, who shall subsequently be required to justify the refusal.

Unless it would jeopardize the safety of any individual, members who are presented with a lawful order that is in conflict with a previous lawful order, department policy or other directive shall

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respectfully inform the issuing supervisor of the conflict. The issuing supervisor is responsible for either resolving the conflict or clarifying that the lawful order is intended to countermand the previous lawful order or directive, in which case the member is obliged to comply. Members who are compelled to follow a conflicting lawful order after having given the issuing supervisor the opportunity to correct the conflict, will not be held accountable for disobedience of the lawful order or directive that was initially issued.

The person countermanding the original order shall notify, in writing, the person issuing the original order, indicating the action taken and the reason.

320.3.2 SUPERVISOR RESPONSIBILITIES

Supervisors and managers are required to follow all policies and procedures and may be subject to discipline for:

- (a) Failure to be reasonably aware of the performance of their subordinates or to provide appropriate guidance and control.
- (b) Failure to promptly and fully report any known misconduct of a member to his/her immediate supervisor or to document such misconduct appropriately or as required by policy.
- (c) Directing a subordinate to violate a policy or directive, acquiesce to such a violation, or are indifferent to any such violation by a subordinate.
- (d) The unequal or disparate exercise of authority on the part of a supervisor toward any member for malicious or other improper purpose.

320.4 GENERAL STANDARDS

Members shall conduct themselves, whether on- or off-duty, in accordance with the United States and Ohio Constitutions and all applicable laws, ordinances and rules enacted or established pursuant to legal authority.

Members shall familiarize themselves with policies and procedures and are responsible for compliance with each. Members should seek clarification and guidance from supervisors in the event of any perceived ambiguity or uncertainty.

Discipline may be initiated for any good cause. It is not mandatory that a specific policy or rule violation be cited to sustain discipline. This policy is not intended to cover every possible type of misconduct.

320.4.1 SALUTING AND PAYING RESPECTS

The practice of saluting in public gives the impression of a well-trained and disciplined organization. Personnel in uniform must render a salute:

- During the passing of the colors (uniformed employees come to attention).
- During the raising or lowering of the colors, or playing of the National Anthem (uniformed employees come to attention and remain until act or anthem is completed).

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- At funeral services.
- During the passing of a funeral procession.

320.5 CAUSES FOR DISCIPLINE

The following are illustrative of causes for disciplinary action. This list is not intended to cover every possible type of misconduct and does not preclude the recommendation of disciplinary action for violation of other rules, standards, ethics and specific action or inaction that is detrimental to efficient department service.

320.5.1 LAWS, RULES AND ORDERS

- (a) Violation of, or ordering or instructing a subordinate to violate any policy, procedure, rule, order, directive, requirement or failure to follow instructions contained in department or Village manuals.
- (b) Disobedience of any legal directive or order issued by any department member of a higher rank.
- (c) Violation of federal, state, local or administrative laws, rules or regulations.

320.5.2 ETHICS

- (a) Using or disclosing one's status as a member of the Yellow Springs Police Department in any way that could reasonably be perceived as an attempt to gain influence or authority for non-department business or activity.
- (b) The wrongful or unlawful exercise of authority on the part of any member for malicious purpose, personal gain, willful deceit or any other improper purpose.
- (c) The receipt or acceptance of a reward, fee or gift from any person for service incident to the performance of the member's duties (lawful subpoena fees and authorized work permits excepted).
- (d) Acceptance of fees, gifts or money contrary to the rules of this department and/or laws of the state.
- (e) Offer or acceptance of a bribe or gratuity.
- (f) Misappropriation or misuse of public funds, property, personnel or services.
- (g) Any other failure to abide by the standards of ethical conduct.

320,5,3 DISCRIMINATION, OPPRESSION OR FAVORITISM

Discriminating against, oppressing or providing favoritism to any person because of age, race, color, creed, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, national origin, ancestry, marital status, physical or mental disability, medical condition or other classification protected by law, or intentionally denying or impeding another in the exercise or enjoyment of any right, privilege, power or immunity, knowing the conduct is unlawful.

320.5.4 RELATIONSHIPS

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- (a) Unwelcome solicitation of a personal or sexual relationship while on-duty or through the use of one's official capacity.
- (b) Engaging in on-duty sexual activity including, but not limited to, sexual intercourse, excessive displays of public affection or other sexual contact.
- (c) Establishing or maintaining an inappropriate personal or financial relationship, as a result of an investigation, with a known victim, witness, suspect or defendant while a case is being investigated or prosecuted, or as a direct result of any official contact.
- (d) Associating with or joining a criminal gang, organized crime and/or criminal syndicate when the member knows or reasonably should know of the criminal nature of the organization. This includes any organization involved in a definable criminal activity or enterprise, except as specifically directed and authorized by this department.
- (e) Associating on a personal, rather than official basis with persons who demonstrate recurring involvement in serious violations of state or federal laws after the member knows, or reasonably should know of such criminal activities, except as specifically directed and authorized by this department.

320.5.5 ATTENDANCE

- (a) Leaving the job to which the member is assigned during duty hours without reasonable excuse and proper permission and approval.
- (b) Unexcused or unauthorized absence or tardiness.
- (c) Excessive absenteeism or abuse of leave privileges.
- (d) Failure to report to work or to place of assignment at time specified and fully prepared to perform duties without reasonable excuse. Inevery case, the employee must document the circumstances resulting in their being late and must also submit a Change of Schedule Request form before the end of the shift for which the employee was late.

320.5.6 UNAUTHORIZED ACCESS, DISCLOSURE OR USE

- (a) Unauthorized and inappropriate intentional release of confidential or protected information, materials, data, forms or reports obtained as a result of the member's position with this department.
- (b) Disclosing to any unauthorized person any active investigation information.
- (c) The use of any information, photograph, video or other recording obtained or accessed as a result of employment or appointment to this department for personal or financial gain or without the express authorization of the Chief of Police or the authorized designee.
- (d) Loaning, selling, allowing unauthorized use, giving away or appropriating any Yellow Springs Police Department badge, uniform, identification card or department property for personal use, personal gain or any other improper or unauthorized use or purpose.
- (e) Using department resources in association with any portion of an independent civil action. These resources include, but are not limited to, personnel, vehicles, equipment and non-subpoenaed records.

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- (f) Addressing public gatherings, appear on radio or television, prepare any articles for publication, act as correspondents to a newspaper or a periodical, and release or divulge investigative information or any other matters of the Police Department while representing the Police Department in such matters, without proper authority.
- (g) Lecturing on "law enforcement" or other related subjects without the prior approval of the Chief of Police.

320.5.7 . EFFICIENCY

- (a) Neglect of duty.
- (b) Unsatisfactory work performance including, but not limited to, failure, incompetence, inefficiency or delay in performing and/or carrying out proper orders, work assignments or the instructions of supervisors without a reasonable and bona fide excuse.
- (c) Concealing, attempting to conceal, removing or destroying defective or incompetent work.
- (d) Unauthorized sleeping during on-duty time or assignments.
- (e) Failure to notify the Department within 24 hours of any change in residence address, contact telephone numbers or marital status.

320.5.8 PERFORMANCE

- (a) Failure to disclose or misrepresenting material facts, or making any false or misleading statement on any application, examination form, or other official document, report or form, or during the course of any work-related investigation.
- (b) The falsification of any work-related records, making misleading entries or statements with the intent to deceive or the willful and unauthorized removal, alteration, destruction and/or mutilation of any department record, public record, book, paper or document.
- (c) Failure to participate in, or giving false or misleading statements, or misrepresenting or omitting material information to a supervisor or other person in a position of authority, in connection with any investigation or in the reporting of any department-related business.
- (d) Interfering with any investigation or case being handled by any other employees of the police department or by any other governmental agency unless a supervisor orders the intervention, or the with the belief, beyond a reasonable doubt, that a manifest injustice would result from failure to take immediate action.
- (e) Being untruthful or knowingly making false, misleading or malicious statements that are reasonably calculated to harm the reputation, authority or official standing of this department or its members.
- (f) Disparaging remarks or conduct concerning duly constituted authority to the extent that such conduct disrupts the efficiency of this department or subverts the good order, efficiency and discipline of this department or that would tend to discredit any of its members.

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- (g) Unlawful gambling or unlawful betting at any time or any place. Legal gambling or betting under any of the following conditions:
 - 1. While on department premises.
 - 2. At any work site, while on-duty or while in uniform, or while using any department equipment or system.
 - 3. Gambling activity undertaken as part of an officer's official duties and with the express knowledge and permission of a direct supervisor is exempt from this prohibition.
- (h) Improper political activity including:
 - 1. Unauthorized attendance while on-duty at official legislative or political sessions.
 - Solicitations, speeches or distribution of campaign literature for or against any
 political candidate or position while on-duty or on department property except
 as expressly authorized by Village policy, the employment agreement, or the
 Chief of Police.
- (i) Engaging in political activities during assigned working hours except as expressly authorized by Village policy, the employment agreement, or the Chief of Police.
- (j) Any act on- or off-duty that brings discredit to this department.
- (k) Employees must submit all necessary reports in an expedient manner. All reports that employees submit must be truthful and complete. Employees must never knowingly report, enter, or cause the entry of any inaccurate, false, or improper information.

320.5.9 CONDUCT

- (a) Failure of any member to promptly and fully report activities on his/her part or the part of any other member where such activities resulted in contact with any other law enforcement agency or that may result in criminal prosecution or discipline under this policy.
- (b) Unreasonable and unwarranted force to a person encountered or a person under arrest.
- (c) Exceeding lawful peace officer powers by unreasonable, unlawful or excessive conduct.
- (d) Unauthorized or unlawful fighting, threatening or attempting to inflict unlawful bodily harm on another.
- (e) Engaging in horseplay that reasonably could result in injury or property damage.
- (f) Discourteous, disrespectful or discriminatory treatment of any member of the public or any member of this department or the Village.
- (g) Use of obscene, indecent, profane or derogatory language while on-duty or in uniform.
- (h) Criminal, dishonest, or disgraceful conduct, whether on- or off-duty, that adversely affects the member's relationship with this department.

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- (i) Unauthorized possession of, loss of, or damage to department property or the property of others, or endangering it through carelessness or maliciousness.
- (j) Attempted or actual theft of department property; misappropriation or misuse of public funds, property, personnel or the services or property of others; unauthorized removal or possession of department property or the property of another person.
- (k) Activity that is incompatible with a member's conditions of employment or appointment as established by law or that violates a provision of any employment agreement or contract to include fraud in securing the appointment or hire.
- (I) Initiating any civil action for recovery of any damages or injuries incurred in the course and scope of employment or appointment without first notifying the Chief of Police of such action.
- (m) Any other on- or off-duty conduct which any member knows or reasonably should know is unbecoming a member of this department, is contrary to good order, efficiency or morale, or tends to reflect unfavorably upon this department or its members.
- (n) Unless approved by the Chief of Police, employees must never surreptitiously record any conversation among or between Yellow Springs employees, except as permitted by Ohio Revised Code § 2933.52.Employees who desire to surreptitiously record any conversation in which they are a participant must notify the other participant(s) before beginning the recording.

320.5.10 SAFETY

- (a) Failure to observe or violating department safety standards or safe working practices.
- (b) Failure to maintain current licenses or certifications required for the assignment or position (e.g., driver license, first aid).
- (c) Failure to maintain good physical condition sufficient to adequately and safely perform law enforcement duties.
- (d) Unsafe firearm or other dangerous weapon handling to include loading or unloading firearms in an unsafe manner, either on- or off-duty.
- (e) Carrying, while on the premises of the work place, any firearm or other lethal weapon that is not authorized by the member's appointing authority.
- (f) Unsafe or improper driving habits or actions in the course of employment or appointment.
- (g) Any personal action contributing to a preventable traffic collision.
- (h) Concealing or knowingly failing to report any on-the-job or work-related accident or injury as soon as practicable but within 24 hours.

320.5.11 INTOXICANTS

(a) Reporting for work or being at work while intoxicated or when the member's ability to perform assigned duties is impaired due to the use of alcohol, medication or drugs, whether legal, prescribed or illegal.

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- (b) Possession or use of alcohol at any work site or while on-duty, except as authorized in the performance of an official assignment. A member who is authorized to consume alcohol is not permitted to do so to such a degree that it may impair on-duty performance.
- (c) Unauthorized possession, use of, or attempting to bring a controlled substance, illegal drug or non-prescribed medication to any work site.

Off-Duty Law Enforcement Actions

342.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The decision to become involved in a law enforcement action when off-duty can place an officer as well as others at great risk and must be done with careful consideration. This policy is intended to provide guidelines for officers of the Yellow Springs Police Department with respect to taking law enforcement action while off-duty.

342.2 POLICY

Officers generally should not initiate law enforcement action while off-duty. Officers should not attempt to initiate enforcement action when witnessing minor crimes, such as suspected intoxicated drivers, reckless driving or minor property crimes. Such incidents should be promptly reported to the appropriate law enforcement agency.

When the safety of the public or the prevention of major property damage requires immediate action, officers should first consider reporting and monitoring the activity and only take direct action as a last resort.

Officers are not expected to place themselves in unreasonable peril. However, any sworn member of this department who becomes aware of an incident or circumstance that he/she reasonably believes poses an imminent threat of serious bodily injury or death, or significant property damage may take reasonable action to minimize the threat.

Officers should remember that their authority as a peace officer may not extend to actions taken outside their jurisdiction unless authorized by law (ORC § 2935.02, ORC § 2935.03(D) and ORC § 2935.04).

342.3 FIREARMS

Officers of this department may carry firearms while off-duty in accordance with federal regulations, state law and Department policy. All firearms and ammunition must meet guidelines as described in the Department Firearms Policy. When carrying firearms while off-duty, officers shall also carry their Department-issued badge and identification.

Officers should refrain from carrying firearms when the consumption of alcohol is likely or when the need to carry a firearm is outweighed by safety considerations. Firearms shall not be carried by any officer who has consumed an amount of an alcoholic beverage or taken any drugs or medications or any combination thereof that would tend to adversely affect the officer's senses or judgment.

Off-duty employees shall not carry firearms in establishments for which a "D" liquor permit has been issued and alcohol is being consumed (ORC § 2923.121(A)).

Off-Duty Law Enforcement Actions

342.4 DECISION TO INTERVENE

There is no legal requirement for off-duty officers to take law enforcement action. However, should officers decide to intervene, they must evaluate whether the action is necessary or desirable and should take into consideration:

- (a) The tactical disadvantage of being alone and the fact there may be multiple or hidden suspects.
- (b) The inability to communicate with responding units.
- (c) The lack of equipment, such as handcuffs, Oleoresin Capsicum (OC) spray or baton.
- (d) The lack of cover.
- (e) The potential for increased risk to bystanders if the off-duty officer were to intervene.
- (f) Unfamiliarity with the surroundings.
- (g) The potential for the off-duty officer to be misidentified by other peace officers or members of the public.

Officers should consider waiting for on-duty uniformed officers to arrive and gather as much accurate intelligence as possible instead of immediately intervening.

342.4.1 INTERVENTION PROCEDURE

If involvement is reasonably necessary, the officer should attempt to call or have someone else call 9-1-1 to request immediate assistance. The operator should be informed that an off-duty officer is on-scene and should be provided a description of the officer if possible.

Whenever practicable, the officer should loudly and repeatedly identify him/herself as an Yellow Springs Police Department officer until acknowledged. Official identification should also be displayed.

342.4.2 INCIDENTS OF PERSONAL INTEREST

Officers should refrain from handling incidents of personal interest, (e.g., family or neighbor disputes) and should remain neutral. In such circumstances, officers should call the responsible agency to handle the matter.

342.4.3 RESPONSIBILITIES

Non-sworn personnel should not become involved in any law enforcement actions while off-duty except to notify the local law enforcement authority and remain at the scene, if safe and practicable.

342,4.4 OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

When encountering a non-uniformed officer in public, uniformed officers should wait for acknowledgement by the non-uniformed officer in case he/she needs to maintain an undercover capability.

Off-Duty Law Enforcement Actions

342.5 REPORTING

Any officer, prior to taking any off-duty enforcement action, shall notify and receive approval of a supervisor (or other applicable law enforcement authority if acting outside the jurisdiction of the Yellow Springs Police Department). If prior contact is not reasonably possible, an officer shall notify the applicable local law enforcement agency as soon as reasonably practicable. The Sergeant shall determine whether a report should be filed by the employee.

Officers should cooperate fully with the agency having jurisdiction in providing statements or reports as requested or as appropriate.

Employees may only use the force which is reasonably necessary to effect lawful objectives including: effecting a lawful arrest or overcoming resistance to a lawful arrest, preventing the escape of an offender, or protecting or defending others or themselves from physical harm.

USE OF DEADLY FORCE

The preservation of human life is of the highest value in the State of Ohio. Therefore, employees must have an objectively reasonable belief deadly force is necessary to protect life before the use of deadly force. Deadly force may be used only under the following circumstances: 1. To defend themselves from serious physical injury or death; or 2. To defend another person from serious physical injury or death; or 3. In accordance with U.S. and Ohio Supreme Court decisions, specifically, *Tennessee v. Garner* and *Graham v. Connor.*

Death Investigation

329,1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The investigation of cases involving death include those ranging from natural causes to homicide. Some causes of death may not be readily apparent and some cases differ substantially from what they appear to be initially. The importance of a thorough death investigation cannot be emphasized enough.

329,2 INVESTIGATION CONSIDERATIONS

Death investigation cases require certain actions be taken. Emergency Medical Services shall be called in all suspected death cases, unless the death is obvious (e.g., decapitated or decomposed). A supervisor shall be notified in all death investigations.

329.2.1 CORONER REQUEST

The Coroner shall be called and notified of all known facts concerning the time, place, manner and circumstances in all sudden or unexpected deaths or deaths due to other than natural causes including, but not limited to (ORC § 313.12(A)):

- (a) Unnatural deaths, including violent deaths arising from homicide, suicide or accident.
- (b) Deaths due to a fire or associated with burns or chemical, electrical or radiation injury.
- (c) Unexplained or unexpected perinatal and postpartum maternal deaths.
- (d) Deaths under suspicious, unusual or unexpected circumstances.
- (e) Deaths of persons whose bodies are to be cremated or otherwise disposed of so that the bodies will later be unavailable for examination.
- (f) Deaths of inmates of public institutions and persons in custody of law enforcement officers who have not been hospitalized primarily for organic disease.
- (g) Deaths that occur during, in association with, or as the result of diagnostic, therapeutic or anesthetic procedures.
- (h) Deaths due to culpable neglect.
- (i) Stillbirths of 20 weeks or longer gestation unattended by a physician.
- (j) Sudden deaths of persons not affected by recognizable disease.
- (k) Unexpected deaths of persons notwithstanding a history of underlying disease.
- (I) Deaths in which a fracture of a major bone, such as a femur, humerus or tibia, has occurred within the past six months.
- (m) Deaths unattended by a physician occurring outside of a licensed health care facility or licensed residential hospice program.
- (n) Deaths of persons not seen by their physician within 120 days of demise.

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Death Investigation

- (o) Deaths of persons occurring in an emergency department.
- (p) Stillbirths or deaths of newborn infants in which there has been maternal use of or exposure to unprescribed controlled substances, including street drugs, or in which there is history or evidence of maternal trauma.
- (q) Unexpected deaths of children.
- (r) Solid organ donors.
- (s) Unidentified bodies.
- (t) Skeletonized remains.
- (u) Unexpected deaths occurring within 24 hours of arrival at a health care facility.
- (v) Deaths associated with the decedent's employment.
- (w) Deaths of nonregistered hospice patients or patients in non-licensed hospice programs.
- (x) Deaths attributable to acts of terrorism.
- (y) Death of a developmentally disabled person, regardless of the circumstances.

329.2.2 SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCE DEATHS

The Coroner, a Deputy Coroner or an appointed Coroner Investigator is required to investigate the site of the death of any child under 2 years of age who dies suddenly when in apparent good health, absent contrary religious beliefs. The investigation is required to incorporate the examinations required by law (OAC § 3701-5-14).

329.2.3 SEARCHING DEAD BODIES

The Coroner or his/her assistants and authorized investigators are generally the only persons permitted to move, handle or search a body known to be dead.

An officer is permitted to make a reasonable search of an individual who it is reasonable to believe is dead, or near death, for a document of gift or other information identifying the individual as a donor or as an individual who made a refusal (ORC § 2108.12(A)(1)). If a donor document is located, the Coroner shall be promptly notified.

Should exigent circumstances indicate to an officer that any other search of a known dead body is warranted prior to the arrival of the Coroner, the investigating officer shall first obtain verbal consent from the Coroner.

Whenever personal effects are removed from the body of the deceased by the Coroner, a receipt shall be obtained. This receipt shall be attached to the death report.

Whenever reasonably possible, a witness, preferably a relative of the deceased or a member of the household, should be requested to remain nearby the scene and available to the officer, pending the arrival of the Coroner.

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The name and address of this person shall be included in the narrative of the death report.

329.2.4 DEATH NOTIFICATION

Officers investigating a traffic collision and who discover any person who is deceased or is pronounced dead at the scene, or who suffers a serious, life-threatening injury in a motor vehicle accident, is responsible for identifying the person and notifying the person's next of kin (ORC § 4501.80).

Identification of victims and notification should be done without delay although proper and accurate identification of victims is necessary prior to making any notification to the next of kin. Identification resources include the next of kin registration database maintained for law enforcement by the Bureau of Motor Vehicles and the Coroner.

Notification to the next of kin of a deceased person shall be made, in person, by the officer assigned to the incident in compliance with Department training on death notifications. If the next of kin lives in another jurisdiction, a law enforcement official from that jurisdiction may be requested to make the personal notification.

In non-traffic deaths, when notification is not performed by the Coroner, and if a deceased person has been identified as a missing person, this department should attempt to locate family members and inform them of the death and location of the deceased missing person's remains as described above.

In all notifications, the notification shall be documented and the Coroner shall be informed whether the notification has been made.

Should a human death result from a fire, this department may notify the state or Village fire marshal as allowed by law.

TheUnited States Department of State requires notification of a consular official when a government official becomes aware of the death of a foreign national.

329.2.5 UNIDENTIFIED DEAD BODIES

If the identity of a dead body cannot be established after the Coroner arrives, the Coroner will issue a "John Doe" or "Jane Doe" number for the report.

329.2.6 UNIDENTIFIED BODIES DATA ENTRY

As soon as reasonably possible, but no later than 30 working days after the date a death is reported to the Department, all available identifying features of the unidentified body including dental records, fingerprints, any unusual physical characteristics and a description of clothing or personal belongings found on or with the body shall be forwarded to the Coroner for entry into the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation database, the Missing Children and Missing Persons Information Clearinghouse and the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) file (ORC § 313.08).

329.2.7 DEATH INVESTIGATION REPORTING

All incidents involving a death shall be documented on the appropriate form.

329.2.8 SUSPECTED HOMICIDE

If the initially assigned officer suspects that the death involves a homicide or other suspicious circumstances, the officer shall take steps to protect the scene. The Unit shall be notified to determine the possible need for an investigator to respond to the scene for further immediate investigation.

If the on-scene supervisor or officer, through consultation with the Sergeant or Investigation Unit supervisor, is unable to determine the manner of death, the investigation shall proceed as though it is a homicide.

The assigned investigator investigating a homicide or a death under suspicious circumstances may, with the approval of his/her supervisor, request the Coroner to conduct physical examinations and tests and provide a report.

329,2,9 EMPLOYMENT-RELATED DEATHS OR INJURIES

Any member of this department who responds to and determines that a death, serious illness or serious injury has occurred as a result of an accident at or in connection with the victim's employment should ensure that the nearest office of the Occupational Health and Safety Administration or the Ohio Public Employment Risk Reduction Program is notified by telephone or electronic notification with all pertinent information.

2.2 (A) Guidelines for Village Policing			

Safety-Centered

Safety is the primary need identified by Yellow Springs community members with regard to police services. Most community members feel that Yellow Springs is a safe community, which is facilitated by cooperation among residents, officers and other community members. The Yellow Springs Police Department (YSPD) supports safety in our Village by being proactive and ensuring that — as much as possible — unsafe situations do not occur. For example, a police vehicle stationed on Xenia Avenue can remind motorists to obey the speed limit, as opposed to setting up a 'speed trap' situation. Friendly police presence around town can also aid in effective police-community relations, so it is important that officers are known and respected by community members.

Other ways that the YSPD meets our needs for safety include helping elderly or disabled individuals, responding quickly to medical emergencies and traffic accidents, and defusing potentially violent situations. The community expects the YSPD to deal effectively with criminal activity and to serve the victims of crime with respect and professionalism – using best practices, data and research to guide the work. Yet, because the rate of actual crime in Yellow Springs is low, it is the more everyday activities that impact how the community experiences and responds to the police.

Resolution-Oriented

Our officers will not seek or initiate conflict, but when our police officers must interrupt unlawful behavior, the community expects that they will act with compassion, flexibility and reasonableness, treating everyone fairly and consistently. Yellow Springs Peace Officers use nonviolent conflict resolution in every way that they can to ensure the safety of the public as well as their own safety. The YSPD seeks to limit the use of weapons and reduce the use of force whenever possible.

Enforcing the law in the case of a minor offense does not warrant risking the safety of the citizen or officer involved. Furthermore, we acknowledge that our department is part of a larger criminal justice system that is often heavy on "law and order." Our goal is that the processes and practices of policing in Yellow Springs be perceived as fair, even by someone who has been

arrested, because we know this helps create a community that is safe for our officers and for the public.

Demonstrably Inclusive

Mutual respect is critical to engender a sense of safety for all residents and visitors of Yellow Springs. This underscores the importance of appreciating the diversity of the individuals who live and interact in our Village. The community expects our officers to protect human rights and civil liberties, proactively working to be fair and impartial – particularly in light of the history of institutional prejudice and discrimination in our country based on race, gender identity, religion, sexual orientation, class, ability, age, heritage and nationality. Our officers must be trained to understand and act with compassion when interacting with individuals managing mental health issues.

The Village of Yellow Springs aims to be not simply tolerant but proactively inclusive and antiracist. The Village of Yellow Springs and our police department commit to identifying,
challenging and changing the values, structures and behaviors that perpetuate systemic racism.
The Village prioritizes equitable practices of hiring and continuing education. And, our officers
are expected to engage with all community stakeholders including youth and parents,
community of color churches and civic groups, all faith based communities, business owners
and entrepreneurs, local education, and nonprofit leaders, and service workers and artists as
well as with groups promoting social justice, equity and human rights to establish relationships,
exchange ideas, initiate projects and create learning opportunities. For these collaborative
relationships to be successful, the YSPD needs to attract and retain a diverse work force who
are open to and excited about meaningfully engaging with our community.

Locally-Minded

The Village of Yellow Springs actively promotes long-term investment and participation in our community by our police officers. Exposure to local culture and events is critical, as developing relationships among community members and officers encourages dedication to and longevity with the Village. It is important that YSPD team members are an active part of our community and feel connected, and the Village needs to facilitate this.

Yellow Springs Village Council and the Village Manager in collaboration with the Chief of Police will use these Guidelines for Village Policing to inform policy, hiring, training, evaluation and leadership decisions that are aligned with community values and support best practices in the Yellow Springs Police Department. The Department should look for opportunities for innovation to enact these Guidelines, and Village leaders should consistently seek community support for and trust in YSPD officers through communication and community engagement.



Cpl. Meister:

Your supervisor, Chief Brian Carlson, has alleged violations of the General Orders Manual by you related to incidents during which he believes you endangered citizen safety. An internal investigation into those incidents was completed by Sgt. Joshuah Knapp, who found the allegations had a basis in fact. Following procedure, Chief Carlson then recommended discipline for those violations and provided you notice of his recommendations. At that point you chose not to accept the recommended discipline. You elected instead to exercise your right to proceed with a pre-disciplinary conference, per the Village Personnel Policy Manual.

Your pre-disciplinary conference was held on Friday, August 3, 2018 before Chief Donald (Randy) Person (Xenia Police Department), a mutually-agreed upon third party. Your attorney, David Duwel, presented your case before Chief Person, who has provided me with his written report and findings. The ten (10) day time frame to complete the report was waived by you at the close of the pre-disciplinary conference. The report presented by Chief Person finds that there are grounds to impose discipline. Chief Person also made recommendations regarding his view on the appropriate discipline that should be imposed on you. Since the role of the hearing officer in a pre-disciplinary conference is to serve as a fact-finder, I have not considered Chief Person's recommendations as to discipline and have only considered his findings as to whether or not the alleged misconduct occurred.

In addition, you and Mr. Duwel were provided a copy of Chief Person's report for the purpose of providing you with the opportunity to comment on the findings. I received and considered the comments from Mr. Duwel on your behalf before issuing this decision.

In preparing this decision, I reviewed the following:

- Both internal investigations into the alleged violations;
- All videos associated with the alleged violations;
- Chief Carlson's recommendations of discipline;
- Chief Person's pre-disciplinary conference report; and
- Your personnel file.

The violations pertain to three incidents involving individuals who were operating vehicles under the influence of alcohol or drugs of abuse, and one incident involving juveniles (each with no valid operator's license) who were in possession of marijuana.

Ex9

FIRST INCIDENT MARCH 14TH

The first incident that came to Chief Carlson's attention occurred on March 14. While on routine patrol you were following a motor vehicle driven by a female driver who attempted to elude you for then-unknown reasons. The driver unsuccessfully attempted to hide in a local apartment building parking lot. Upon approaching the vehicle and engaging in conversation with the driver, you concluded there was substantial evidence the driver was intoxicated. You also determined she was driving under suspension for a prior OVI conviction.

Your cited the female for operating the vehicle while under suspension, had the vehicle towed and transported the female and her passenger to a private residence within the Village. It should be noted that you wrote a report indicating that this person was highly intoxicated and had a previous OVI conviction, but you did not investigate further as to whether or not she should be charged with a second OVI offense. Policy dictates this be done. It would still have been within your discretion, after further investigating, to resolve the situation as you did, based on the evidence, but you did not follow established written procedure. (G.O. 4.4 (C)1-6, General Orders Manual.)¹ Had this incident stood alone in your violations, a counseling letter to adhere to policy would have been sufficient as a resolution. Unfortunately, it does not.

I note that Chief Person found you violated established policy during this incident.

C. OVI Countermeasures

- Drivers who are impaired by alcohol and/or drugs represent a serious threat to the life and safety of persons using the streets and highways of this state. Consequently, a comprehensive coordinated counter measure program involving education, enforcement, adjudication, treatment, and public support is essential if the agency is to have long term success in combating the OVI problem.
- Enforcement is a key element in the OVI countermeasure program. Officers must detect and apprehend impaired drivers.
- Officers must be alert for signs of alcohol and/or drug impairment in all contacts with motorists.
- Officers must make an arrost of an impaired driver whon probable cause to arrest is present; however, incarcoration is not always a requirement.
- Officers must incarcerate a follony OVI violator unless a medical condition results in the violator's admission to a hospital or medical facility.
- Officers may release a misdomeanor OVI violator by arranging for other transportation as an alternative to incarceration. Officers must make their decision to incarcerate or release the violator based upon;
 - Whether there is a need for medical attention.
 - b. The location and availability of a responsible party to assume custody of the violator.

SECOND INCIDENT MARCH 7TH

The second incident occurred on March 7, 2018, and came to the Chief's attention after the first incident summarized above. This incident again involved an intoxicated subject who was driving while dark in the early morning hours without lights, driving over curbs and noviously failing to control the vehicle. In this instance, you stopped the individual and, according to the synopsis of your interview with Sgt. Knapp, determined he was, in fact, highly intoxicated, exhibiting slurred speech, unsteadiness on his feet and other indicators of intoxication. In fact, you specifically noted that you were concerned enough that you did not feel comfortable letting him drive. In addition, there were unopened beer cans in the passenger compartment. You parked the car and told the individual to pick the keys up at the Police Department in the morning. On the video, this individual is heard slurring words and is seen falling into the side of the vehicle while you were securing it. You then allowed the individual to walk home.

Chief Carlson and I share the same concern here, in that you allowed a highly intoxicated individual to walk home, in the dark, in the very early morning hours. The subject offered to allow you to drive him home, but you told him he seemed able to walk okay. You did not Insist on driving him home even after you watched the individual fall into the side of his vehicle. Additionally, you never ran the subject's driving record, which would have been standard procedure for anyone stopped for a driving offense, especially someone driving under the influence. If you had done so, you would have discovered that he was under a Non-compliance suspension and had a previous OVI conviction in 2016, which appears on his driving record and to which he admitted on the video of the stop. Under these circumstances, you would have towed the vehicle as required by law, similar to the above-noted incident, as the circumstances were the same. You could have then driven him home safely. This incident was the primary catalyst for Chief Carlson's concern that you did not ensure public safety.

I note that Chief Person found you violated established policy during this incident.

THIRD INCIDENT APRIL 25TH

The third incident occurred on April 25, 2018. This situation involved two juveniles who were sitting in a parked car at the Yellow Springs Water Treatment Plant during the early morning hours. Neither juvenile had a valid driver's license, nor did either juvenile have permission from the registered owner of the vehicle to be driving it. In this case, you allowed one of the juveniles to drive the vehicle home (even though neither juvenile was legally allowed to drive since neither was a licensed driver) instead of insisting that the owner or another licensed driver come to get the vehicle. You also did not follow up with the registered owner of the vehicle to see if he (1) had gotten his vehicle back or (2) wanted to pursue charges.

In addition, the juveniles had a small quantity of marijuana in their possession. As you allowed them to dispose of the marijuana by dumping it on the ground, you violated Village of Yellow Springs General Orders in regard to the collection and disposal of evidence. Even though you were not issuing charges, you were still required to collect the marijuana and submit it for destruction. At that time, you were serving as a Field Training Officer for a new officer and this would have been a perfect opportunity to teach him the proper procedure. While this allegation was found to have a factual basis, Chief Carlson

has withdrawn this charge, as he prefers to resolve it through counseling. I am not considering this incident in my decision to impose discipline.

FOURTH INCIDENT MAY 22ND

The fourth incident occurred on May 22, 2018. This incident began when dispatch received a call from the on-duty personnel of the Miami Township Fire Department reporting a highly intoxicated individual on a bicycle near the bike path behind the Fire and Rescue Station on Corry Street. This intoxicated individual was verbally assaulting people on the bike path and acting in a disorderly manner.

You located the individual, who you found to be, in fact, highly intoxicated, as reported to dispatch. Your decision in this case was to instruct him to walk his bicycle home. Even though—he denied had been drinking and taking medications that interact strongly with alcohol, your training as an EMT should have made it readily apparent to you that this individual was impaired to a great extent due to some additional influence. In fact, he later admitted to you that he had been taking Gabapentin and you found empty liquor bottles in his pack. You then talked with the complainant at the Fire Station. The intoxicated individual, who lives in the immediate vicinity of the Fire Station, walked a short distance, decided to ride his bicycle and, in the end, injured himself by crashing his bicycle on the roadway on Fairfield Pike at Winter Street, quite a distance from his home. His crash necessitated that the medical unit from Miami Township Rescue be called and the subject was transported to the hospital for treatment, including stitches to his face. In fact, when this individual was later interviewed about the incident, he did not remember anything about what had happened. In this instance, simply putting the bicycle in the trunk of the vehicle and driving the individual home would have been a better choice than letting him ride off.

Chief Person found that you erred in your judgment but the incident, standing alone, warrants something other than formal discipline. I accept this factual finding and with this decision I am instructing the Chief to address this situation in the context of your meetings with him.

I want to make clear that it is the paramount duty of every officer who works in the Village that decisions at all times must ensure the safety of the public. This means both individual safety and the safety of the public as a whole. The failure to protect the public constitutes not only a violation of the General Orders Manual, but also of the Guidelines for Village Policing, which specifically state:

Safety-Centered: Safety is the primary need identified by Yellow Springs Community members with regard to police services. Most community members feel that Yellow Springs is a safe community, which is facilitated by cooperation among residents, officers and other community members. The Yellow Springs Palice Deportment (YSPD) supports safety in our Village by being proactive and ensuring that – as much as possible – unsafe situations do not occur.

The Yellow Springs Police Department Code of Ethics also states, among other things, that it is every officer's responsibility:

- (1) to safeguard lives and property,
- (2) to perform his or her duties impartially, never allowing personal feelings to influence decisions, and
- (3) to have consistent and wise use of discretion within the law.

Sometimes the use of discretion means making sure that individuals are able to arrive safely at their destination by an appropriate means other than allowing them to take themselves. You did so on March 14, 2018, but in three other instances, all of which occurred within a two and one-half month time period, you failed to ensure public safety.

I am concerned that the incidents for which I will be imposing discipline occurred within such a short time period and that they all indicate an inability, on your part, to determine the best way to ensure the public's safety. The primary issue is not your decision whether to charge, arrest and cite the individuals to court. The primary issue is that you did not ensure individual and public safety. Additionally, you have put the Village and yourself in a position of responsibility and potential liability for harm or injury these individuals may have caused to themselves and/or others. Finally, the facts show you failed to follow long established policy that pre-dates your promotion to corporal.

Both Chief Carlson and I acknowledge the challenges police officers face when exercising the powers of law enforcement. I also note that in your interviews conducted in the internal investigations, you stated that you have difficulty making enforcement decisions when they involve Village residents with whom you are familiar. This difficulty stems, in part, because you live in the Village. However, it is imperative that you not let your familiarity with an individual impact his or her safety or the safety of others. Letting impaired individuals go without ensuring a responsible party assumes responsibility for the impaired person creates liability exposure to the Village and the potential for harm to others. I also note that you admitted in your statements that you could have and, perhaps, should have made different decisions in these instances. I agree with your assessment.

I next note there are inconsistencies between what your written report says and what you said during the course of the investigation and the pre-disciplinary conference. For instance, both on the video and in your report for the March 14th incident, you state that the person was driving very slowly, was slow to respond to questions and had other indicators that she was under the influence of something. But when asked about this during your interview, you said you did not have enough evidence to say she was under the influence. Also, in the video of the March 7th incident, you are clearly heard saying, "The reason I'm pulling you over is because you don't have your lights on and you hit the curb when you were going around the corner there." However, in your statement during the interview, you stated that you did not see this, and that the driver got close to the curb while making his turn but did not drive over it. These inconsistencies concern me and I am directing Chief Carlson to address this as well.

As Chief Person wrote in his report: "Police Discretion is Not Absolute...[P]olice officers still have to follow codified rules and regulations for more serious incidents...[A]n officer must ensure both the safety of the community and the safety of the individuals detained when dealing with potentially intoxicated individuals." This does not mean you must arrest everyone for every charge. As an officer with the Yellow Springs Police Department, you may use your discretion, within reasonable limits. You noted during your

interviews that you did not feel you had appropriate indicators to perform Field Sobriety Tests on these individuals. However, in other, very similar situations with fewer indicators of inebriation, you have charged drivers with OVI. (See Traffic Stops 14-3320 and 14-2800.) The expectation is that you will enforce the law consistently and without favoritism.

Another thing you must consider when exercising your discretion is whether or not releasing the person without a citation is helpful or, potentially, harmful to them. As you well know, one function courts serve is to connect individuals who need help with those who can help them. In the March 7th and 14th and May 22nd incidents, there were previous violations involving the influence of alcohol or drugs. Would any of these individuals have benefited in some way from those professional substance abuse services? Were they willing to seek those services on their own? Did you ask them? Did you refer them to the Community Outreach Specialist for follow up? If you had cited them to court, is there a possibility that they would have been mandated treatment? Could you, as the citing officer, spoken to the prosecutor about that? Is that part of your mandate as an officer? I also note that, when considering the appropriateness of a referral to our Community Outreach Specialist, the exercise of discretion should take into account whether or not someone is a first time offender.

You have been verbally counseled on several occasions for your failure to follow policy in other situations. Your file reflects the following:

- o One commendation for actively apprehending a suspect during the robbery at WesBanco.
- Two letters thanking you for assistance.
- One letter alleging you acted improperly on a traffic stop. (While considered founded in fact, no formal action was taken.)
- One letter of counseling for a minor policy violation.
- o Two prior investigations into separate incidents of policy violations, resulting in a one-day suspension for each violation. (I note that, in both cases, you agreed that the discipline was appropriate and accepted it.)

I reference this prior discipline because it reflects the problem that needs to be addressed. An officer does have discretion to deviate from established policy if they can give adequate justification for their actions. You have not, in any of these instances, been able to provide that Justification. You have, in fact, admitted that you did not have such justification.

I find that you have violated the General Orders Manual, the Guidelines for Village Policing, and the Yellow Springs Police Department Code of Ethics for Police Officers. You are currently in the middle of a one-year probationary period resulting from your promotion to the rank of Corporal. Mindful of your probationary status, in keeping with the policy of progressive discipline, and considering the serious nature of the failure to consider citizen safety, I find Chief Carlson's revised recommendation of discipline, which was issued the day after the original recommendation but not made public until now, to be appropriate in this instance. In general keeping with that recommendation:

1. You will be immediately reassigned to the rank of Road Patrol Officer and your pay will be reduced accordingly. Chief Carlson will provide your new duty assignment.

- 2. A Performance Improvement Period (PIP) will be instituted, during which you will attend training specifically chosen to address deficiencies noted in these incidents. You will also attend training with Chief Carlson in order that he be able to help you better understand the proper actions that ensure public safety while also adhering to the Guidelines for Village Policing established by Village Council and in the use of your discretion as an officer with the YSPD. This period shall extend for six (6) months from the date of issuance of this discipline or until completion of the necessary training courses, as necessitated by the training schedule at the Ohio Peace Officers Training Academy, and until said sessions with Chief Carlson have been completed to his satisfaction, whichever comes later. Chief Carlson will provide you with the details of your PIP.
- 3. In addition to the regular meetings with Chief Carlson, you shall have two reviews during this period. One review shall occur on or about the third month of the PIP. The second shall occur at the end of month 6 of the PIP and shall determine if all requirements have been met and performance improved, or if the PIP should be extended and under what circumstances.
- 4. This discipline will serve for all instances noted in this document and no further disciplinary action will be taken on those noted incidents. However, this discipline may be considered in any future disciplinary action for other violations not noted in this document.

While the General Orders Manual for the Police Department specifically notes that a one-year probationary period be instituted for any change in rank, including demotion, I suspend that requirement in this instance. You should be aware that any further violations of policy or failure to ensure the safety of citizens will result in further discipline. Such discipline can be of any level, up to and including termination. I encourage you or any officer, if in any doubt as to how to proceed, to contact a supervisor and ask the proper action under the particular circumstances that present themselves at any given time.

Officer Meister, you are a valued member of the Yellow Springs Police Department and the community, but you must improve the critical thinking used in your decision making. The Village is committed to working with you to make this happen.

Additionally, Chief Carlson spoke with me after the pre-disciplinary conference but prior to the issuance of the pre-disciplinary conference report. The position of Corporal will not be immediately reposted. Chief Carlson believes, and I agree, that you may want to consider reapplying when the posting does occur after the PIP has been completed and there have been no more instances of discipline.

Given the state of law enforcement and criminal justice on a national level, it is imperative that all of our officers exercise their discretion wisely, fairly and consistently, while adhering to existing laws and statutes.

Errata sheet for Disciplinary Letter dated August 27, 2018

Pg 2, first paragraph, 4th sentence:

"Upon approaching the vehicle and engaging in conversation with the driver, you concluded there was substantial evidence the driver was intoxicated."

I noted several cues to possible impairment. I would not categorize my few observations as substantial evidence the driver was intoxicated. After conversing with the driver outside of the car, I determined she was not under the influence of alcohol.

Pg. 2, second paragraph, 2nd sentence:

"It should be noted that you wrote a report indicating that this person was highly intoxicated and had a previous OVI conviction, but you did not investigate further as to whether or not she should be charged with a second OVI offense."

My written report does not indicate a highly intoxicated person. Several cues of possible impairment were noted in my written report. For me to describe a person as highly intoxicated, they must be showing signs such as unsteadiness on their feet, slurring their speech and showing a level of confusion well beyond what I observed with this driver.

Pg. 3, first paragraph, 2nd sentence:

"This incident again involved an intoxicated subject who was driving while dark in the early morning hours without lights, driving over curbs and obviously failing to control the vehicle." I observed the driver make a tight right turn and bump the curb. I would not describe the observed driving behavior as "obviously failing to control the vehicle". On Page 5 in the fifth paragraph you quote me as saying "...you hit the curb..." not driving over curbs.

Pg. 3, first paragraph, 3rd sentence:

"In this instance, you stopped the individual and, according to the synopsis of your interview with Sgt. Knapp, determined he was, in fact, highly intoxicated, exhibiting slurred speech, unsteadiness on his feet and other indicators of intoxication."

I did not determine the driver was "highly intoxicated". Sgt. Knapp made the statements about observed slurred speech and being unsteady on his feet, from the video he watched. I did not observe the driver stumble into the car at the time it happened, but on review of the video I did see it. This was well after the incident had occurred.

Pg. 3, second paragraph, 3rd sentence:

"You did not insist on driving him home even after you watched the individual fall into the side of his vehicle."

After reviewing video of the traffic stop, prior to my interview with Sgt. Knapp, I observed the driver stumble and fall against the car. I did not observe that stumble on scene.

Pg. 3, second paragraph, 5th sentence:

"If you had done so, you would have discovered that he was under a Non-compliance suspension and had a previous OVI conviction in 2016, which appears on his driving record and to which he admitted on the video of the stop."

The driver does not have a prior OVI conviction on his record. The driver stated he had a prior OVI, but he was incorrect in that statement, his prior conviction was for Physical Control. It further states I should have towed the vehicle according to state law. There is no state law requiring the impoundment of the vehicle under the circumstances of this particular traffic stop.

Pg. 5, fourth paragraph, 6th sentence:

"I also note that you admitted in your statements that you could have and, perhaps, should have made different decisions in these instances."

It is always easier to make decisions in hindsight with the luxury of time to endlessly analyze a situation and determine different outcomes from the analysis.

Pg. 5, fifth paragraph, 4th sentence:

"Also, in the video of the March 7th incident, you are clearly heard saying. "The reason I'm pulling you over is because you don't have your lights on and you hit the curb when you were going around the corner there." "

The driver turned sharply bumping the curb, which is what I am quoted from the video. I have tried to make the distinction between what others have tried to interject as driving over curbs and what the driver actually did, which was merely bumping a tire into the curb.

Pg. 7, fourth paragraph, 1st sentence:


"While the General Orders Manual for the Police Department specifically notes that a one-year probationary period be instituted for any change in rank, including demotion, I suspend that requirement in this instance."

While it is appreciated the probationary period was waived, I am unable to find this particular policy in any of the YSPD General Orders. If a copy of this policy would be provided to myself and to Mr. Duwel, I would appreciate the chance to read this policy.

The only reference to probationary periods I could find is in the Village of Yellow Springs Personnel Policy Manual. Section 205 states that probationary periods are for newly hired, rehired, promoted or transferred employees. There is no reference to demotion in section 205.

VILLAGE OF YELLOW SPRINGS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING WITH DAVID MEISTER

In an effort to improve upon your job performance as a peace officer with the Village of Yellow Springs Police Department and , this Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is intended to address the following aspects of your job performance that require immediate attention.

- Understanding of the Proper Course of Action with OVI Subjects while on Traffic Stops:
 Failure to follow General Orders regarding impaired drivers on multiple separate occasions allowing repeat offenders to receive improper correction and or the availability for help with substance abuse issues must be addressed. The goal is to obtain better decision making processes.
- Understanding in Decision Making with Arrest Discretion:
 The Village of Yellow Springs Police Department operates with the primary focus of public safety, the safety of every citizen we encounter and the safety of the officers. Your decision during OVI traffic stops where you released intoxicated subjects without assuring their safety is unacceptable. Your decisions put the safety of the subjects and the general public at risk. Resolution oriented policing and arrest discretion is permitted within my administration but with repeat OVI offenders your failure to follow protocol and use acceptable discretionary methods creates a present and future safety concern for the citizens involved and the general public and officers who may encounter these subjects in the future.

GOALS

The Village of Yellow Springs Police Department has created the following goals in order to help you improve your job performance.

- Complete an additional OPOTA certified course in Alcohol Detection, Apprehension, and Prosecution of Impaired Drivers. (ADAP)
- Complete an OPOTA certified course in Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement.
 (ARIDE)
- Complete an assessment of your understanding of the Village of Yellow Springs policy regarding OVI traffic stops.
- Work directly with the Chief of Police regarding the Village Guidelines, specifically the Police Departments approach to resolution oriented policing and arrest discretion.



 Work with the Chief of Police to foster and maintain professional respect and collegiality within the Department.

This MOU will be active for six (6) months, but may be extended if improvement is not recognized by the Chief of Police. You will meet with the Chief of Police once every thirty (30) days to discuss these MOU objectives, and your progress toward meeting the goals identified above.

The meetings with the Chief of Police will provide you with the opportunity to discuss any issues or problems you have in your progress toward reaching these goals. Every effort will be made to provide the support necessary for you to meet these goals and objectives.

Failure to meet the goals set forth in this document during the specified timeframe may lead to
termination of your employment. A decrease in performance after successfully completing the
period contemplated in this memorandum may also result in termination of your employment
without the issuance of a warning or an improvement plan. Nothing in this document represents a
promise or contract of future employment or changes the at-will nature of your employment
relationship. By signing this Memorandum of Understanding, the parties commit to moving forward
in a positive and constructive manner.
